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51 Elizabeth students honored as 2016 STARS

Fifty-one students from the Elizabeth School District were honored at the 18th annual banquet, Salute to the 2016 S.T.A.R.S., Students Taking Accountability and Responsibility Seriously.

The banquet, a project of the Elizabeth Education Foundation, was held at Elizabeth High School on Saturday, Apr. 2.

Students were nominated by their teachers for the individual qualities they brought to the classroom and those that made them stand out as friends, tutors, role models, achievers, those who continuously strive to do their best, and more.

It was "A time for us to come together to pause, to reflect and to celebrate. It is a time to be inspired, humbled and moved," Superintendent Douglas Bissonette said in his opening welcome.

Jace Glick of Jace Glick Sells Team served again as master of ceremonies, calling each student up individually to read their teacher's nomination statement. He spoke to them one on one about their likes, ambitions, extracurricular activities and more.
